 - Board increased amount to \$8,000 for 2019 as they considered only \$1,700 was spent in 2018 (had up to \$5,000 to spend). Staff commented that there is no carryforward provision set up in the finances for this line item.

Committee Reports

1. Director Updates

Salmon Arm

- Ban on plastic bags starting July 1st in the city
- Open house on new recycling/garbage program
- o Communication protocol signed with 1st nations. 3 bands present at the meeting.
- Public street solicitation bylaw passed. Community now talking about "how can they help the homeless."
- o 105 units of housing coming for homeless
- FCM convention noticed that there is a distinct appetite to bypass the province and talk directly to the local governments. Feds doubled gas tax payments directly by to local governments.
- New indoor tennis facility grand opening.

Kamloops

- o Trans Mountain pipeline approval great for the city especially with the mill closures and unemployed tradesman in neighbouring communities.
- o Biosolids to be trucking the treated biosolids to Turtle Valley (70 km away). Meeting with protests. Provincial government not defending their policies that land use is the best use of biosolids. Also working with Little Shuswap Lake Indian Band to put biosolids on the new golf course they are planning to build.

Lumby

- Kindness meter
- Resurfacing outdoor tennis courts
- Medical marijuana plant first crop has been grown and sent to the Federal Government for testing before they can get their license.
- o No flooding in 2019. In process of removing berms.
- Starting to look at plastic bag ban.
- o Community Forests getting fir beetle which will change up the cutting schedule
- Wastewater plant looking at changes

Clearwater

- Plastic bags student council sent out survey to community and hosted business luncheon to find out the pulse of the community. Council moving forward on ban.
- o Community raised over \$15,000 for high school soccer team to attend provincials.
- Mill closing putting 175 people out of work. No help from Province.

Logan Lake

- District office should be ready to be moved into by end of the month.
- o Community Forest received \$10,000 Robin Hood grant.
- Logan Lake RCMP members will be used to assist Merritt's shortage during the summer
- o 2 physicians are leaving shortly (at end of their term) but community has heard of interest from other doctors.

RDOS

- Plastic bag ban on agenda June 20th. Concerned with the ability to enforce ban with businesses. Canadian Plastic Bag Association appealing the Victoria decision to ban bags and waiting to hear outcome.
- o Library funding need more funding across the province. Province funding down to 5% from 23%.

• Pilot project: homeless people welcomed at the library. No address is needed anymore to get a library card.

Summerland

- Youth council forming at the Summerland high school next year. Plastic bag ban is on their agenda
- Official opening of the skate park
- o Contingency site for the solar panel/battery storage site
- Asset management system inventory is in place, policy and strategy are done.
- o Looking to get an Agriculture Innovation Centre in Summerland.

Penticton

- 4-3 vote to approve councillor's/mayor's salary back to even re: loss of the 1/3 tax free allowance
- Councillors to be reported on quarterly re: community and council attendance
- o Cannabis approved 14 stores, 8 applications have been set to the Province
- o Doctor shortage 10,000 people without a doctor. Looking to get more nurse practitioners.
- Homelessness 162 units being built
 - Changing bylaws re: getting people off the streets/panhandling

Coldstream

- Open house for parking lot for rail trail access
- Plastic bag ban starting to investigate
- Organic waste education for the community
- New water facility UV light to clean the water; just won award
- o Housing and rules to bring in out of country farm workers seasonal and migrant

2. Finance Report

- As at May 31, 2019 SILGA had \$45,886 in the bank and \$111,495 in the MFA account.
- Membership dues letters in the amount of \$42,436 were sent out in early June.
 SILGA has received payments to date of \$1,500. No complaints or comments have been received with the increased amounts.
- Area Association comparison given to board showing the differences in the revenues/membership dues etc around the province.
- Staff noted that the 50/50 draw at the convention was too successful and SILGA went over on the amount raised for a Class D license. Next year SILGA will have to have two separate draws.
