

#### Dr. Mark DeVolder

Dr. DeVolder distinguishes himself as a change management specialist and is one of today's original thinkers and motivators on transitions. Often in the spotlight for high profile transitions, Mark offered guidance for the ending of the NASA Space Shuttle Program and helped Colombian business leaders adapt to the NAFTA Free Trade Agreement. Mark's mission and passion is to help people and organizations adapt boldly, nimbly and quickly in the midst of exponential change.

#### Dr. Gord McIntosh

Gordon McIntosh has 37 years of management, educator and consultancy roles with local government. As President of the Local Government Leadership (LGL) Institute, he provides governance development, strategic facilitation and leadership training services. He has conducted 1,200 workshops involving 140,000 elected and appointed officials. Gord will be facilitating one plenary session and two breakout sessions during the convention.

## **Emergency Management BC Session Modernizing BC Emergency Management Legislation**

This session was held on December 6<sup>th</sup> in Kamloops with 6 Ministry representatives addressing the participants. 45 local government leaders and staff attended the session, which was the only one put on by an area association. Feedback was very positive with invaluable information made available from both directions. Staff and local government leaders on the front lines learned what the Ministry is planning while Ministry staff received feedback on how to improve the processes and what is needed from communities dealing with emergencies. The “world café” style of meeting was very effective and allowed excellent transference of information as the participants changed groups when they moved to different tables. The Okanagan Basin Water Board has also submitted numerous recommendations in response to this session. Ministry staff commended SILGA for hosting this important dialogue, adding that we were the only Area Association to do so.

*The Centre treats approximately 4500 million liters of influent annually. The high-quality reclaimed water is then pumped 8 km to a reservoir and used as a primary source of irrigation water on approximately 850 ha of agricultural lands, tree farms, sports fields, and three large golf courses.*

# ALC Information Update

## Extended grandfathering of Manufactured Homes for Family in the ALR

The deadline to receive all required authorization to locate a manufactured home for family members in the ALR has been extended from February 22, 2020 to December 31, 2020. On January 28<sup>th</sup>, the Provincial Government deposited Order in Council 28/2020 (OIC 28/2020) which amended s 32. (3)(c) and (d) of the ALR Use Regulation as it relates to the date authorizations must be granted by to place a manufactured home for family. Please refer to [OIC 28/2020](#) as the ALR Use Regulation has not been updated yet.

## Manufactured Homes – ALC Policy L-25

The Commission has adopted a definition of a manufactured home in ALC Land Use Policy L-25. Policy L-25 can be found in the Land Use Policy dropdown of the [ALC Policies and Bulletins](#) page on the ALC website.

## Farm-Related Commercial and Farm-Related Industrial Uses – ALC Policy L-24

## Ministry of Agriculture's Residential Flexibility Policy Paper

In a news release dated Monday, January 27<sup>th</sup>, 2020, the Province is proposing more residential flexibility for people living in the Agricultural Land Reserve (ALR) as outlined in a new policy intentions paper released January 27<sup>th</sup>, 2020, by the Ministry of Agriculture. The news release contains a link to the Ministry's Policy Intention Paper and their "What We Heard" report from the 2019 public engagement. ## Giving homeless and marginalized peoples support and assistance through libraries.

From the 2019 UBCM meeting with the SILGA board, a Memorandum of Understanding has been signed between the Okanagan Regional Library and the Minister of Social Development and Poverty Reduction to fund Community Integration Specialists. These part-time workers provide outreach services to marginalized individuals who are clients of the Employment and Assistance program and recipients of assistance under the Acts. The downtown Kelowna, Rutland and Westbank libraries will be used in this pilot project. Outreach services provided will be information and help completing applications on the Employment and Assistance programs.



## Inviting our Neighbours!

We are looking forward to continued conversations with the Indigenous governments within the SILGA region and looking for broader engagement. As you may recall, the SILGA executive did a 'travelling road show' in early 2019 to update member municipalities and regional districts (both returning and newly elected officials) on the benefits of SILGA membership.
