- Thank you to SILGA for representing our region and Salmon Arm
- Focus on building relationships, internally and externally
- The most qualified council member leads committees
- Easy to attract talented staff because of the community amenities and a well working council
- New supportive housing built in partnership with BC Housing and CMHA
- New city shelter work camp unit (25-30 beds) 24 hr/365 days open no more tent encampments in Salmon Arm
 - o Salmon Arm charging BC Housing \$1/yr for rent
- Ross St Underpass project first started in 1988 but wasn't finished until 2023
 - Needed community buy in
 - Needed CPKC to financially get the project off the ground
- West Bay Connector Trail

- o 6.5 km joint venture with Adams Lake and Neskonlith bands
- Safe passage into Salmon Arm without walking on the railway tracks
- OCPizza a way to involve community (yes bribery) to get feedback on the OCP
- 55+ Games again another relationship building with community involvement
 - Lots of pride generated in the community and with Salmon Arm City staff
- Licorice Fridays Mayor hands out licorice to staff and gives staff an opportunity to chat with mayor human to human
